Political Signs, banners and/or flags.

– Per the Rules these items are allowed to be displayed ONLY for NATIONAL elections and may NOT be placed in the yard or on home more than 60 days before the national election day. 2024 National election day is 11/5/24 so no signs may be placed before 9/6/24. No signs, flags, or banners are allowed to be displayed where visible for any other local or state elections, only the NATIONAL Presidential election.

Reminder on lamp posts: per the rules & regulations of the park; each home is required to have an operational lamppost that must be illuminated during evening hours (dusk to dawn) and must be operational year around. Please make sure that your lamppost is in compliance.

<u>Hurricane preparedness</u> It is hurricane season, so anything that could become a projectile, will need to be stored or secured for the safety of all.

<u>Inoperative vehicles:</u> Per current rules effective 3/1/2022 "No junk, inoperative, or unlicensed vehicles may be used or parked in the community at any time". Owners will be given a 24-hour notice for removal prior to it being towed at their expense.

Yards and homes: Please make arrangements to have your home cleaned and beds weeded as summer means mold and weeds. Failure to do so will result in a 14-day notice to cure, followed by staff doing the work and your account being charged if not done timely. This includes properly disposing of the pulled weeds, not just letting the yard waste linger on your lawn creating dead spots as this will be cleared by staff if needed and charged to the offending resident. Garbage or yard waste may not be placed on the street any earlier than 4 PM the night before scheduled pick up. Violations of this rule have resulted in Country Lakes staff removing the items and charging the resident. The intent is to minimize the amount of time we have to look at trash or refuse.

Gate Update- As of this writing, we still have not been given a firm date yet when they will be operational but hopefully, we will in the in the near future. As of now they will be open during the day just like the old gates were. There will be ability to enter a 4-digit code at the 2 main entry points if you do not have your clicker. The 4 digit is your lot number. If you have a 3-digit lot number then add a zero in front. EXAMPLE- Lot 200 = 0200. There will be either the pound (#) key or the star (*) key preceding the 4 digit or after, we have not been apprised as of now. This information should NOT be given out to anyone that is NOT a resident. Visitors will be able to find the person they are

looking for in the call box directory that will be located at the main entrance to each park and call them on that call box. When the resident picks up they will be able to remotely open the gates from their phone that is being called. That continues to be all we know as of this writing. Any update will be circulated via email & on Facebook. We still have clickers in stock for those that have not gotten one. \$20 check or money order made payable to Country Lakes for the deposit of each clicker.

<u>Parking-</u> There is no overnight parking allowed at the clubhouses or on any street. Steve White Towing has been authorized to patrol the communities at night and tow any violators. Hopefully, this will discourage this practice.

July Update from the Advisory Board



The Advisory Board has adopted a new rule regarding its directors. A director may serve two two-year terms after which they must be off the board for one year before applying again. This is being done to promote diversity and transparency.

We will be meeting with Terry on Tuesday, July 16th with the intent of addressing the following topics:

- 1. We would like an update on the gate installation:
- 2. A chain link fence will be installed up to the gate at all entrances. The gate installation is being handled by MHM.
- 3. Are there cameras at the entrances and if so, are they operational? The recent theft of a golf cart from CLVI has heightened everyone's awareness of security:
 - Yes, cameras are operational at all entrances.
- 4. We would like a trash receptacle in the area of the large Tiki hut and cornhole court.
 - One will be placed in the Tiki hut area.
- 5. We would like the community to be more aware of the benefits of recycling. Can there be a recycling container near the mailboxes? Most of the contents of the trash can are likely paper from junk mail and therefore recyclable:
 - A recycling container will be placed in the mailbox area of both CLVI and CLVII.
- 6. Ice machine in CLVI, status, and do all MHM properties use the same ice machine? If so possibly MHM could have a spare on hand to put in place when any of the community's machines

- go down.
- A repair part arrived yesterday (7-15-24) and is in the process of replacement.
 Upon repair, it will be returned to CLVI.
- 7. The Advisory Board would like to once again request that the new gates be closed 24/7.
- The board is working directly with Bob Miller on this, we are in the process of creating a google survey that will contain the pros and cons of gates being closed 24/7. This will go out to all residents of both communities when completed.

The results of these meetings are posted on the bulletin boards of both clubhouses in the area marked Advisory Board and will be updated each month.

Grandparent and Family Scams

Here's how they work:

You get a call: "Grandma, I need money for bail." Or maybe an email from someone claiming to be your brother or a friend who says they're in trouble. They need money for a medical bill. Or some other kind of emergency. The caller says it's urgent — and tells you to keep it a secret.

But is the caller who you think it is? Scammers are good at pretending to be someone they're not. They can be convincing: **sometimes using information from social networking sites**, or hacking into your loved one's email account, all to make it seem more real. And they'll pressure you to send money before you have time to think.

Here's what to do:

- Stop. Check it out. Look up your family member's phone number yourself and call another family member to check out the story.
- Pass this information on to a friend. You may not have gotten one of these calls, but chances are, you know someone who will get one — if they haven't already.

5. Florida Is the Only State Tucked Between Both the Atlantic Ocean and the Gulf of Mexico



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GUIDELINES FOR CLVII RAC RESIDENT EVENTS

- 1. The event head count will not exceed 120 people for any event. The posted number of persons listed by the fire department shows 164 however, that number includes the library, game room, and fitness center. Those areas are not usually used during events.
- 2. All events are posted in the Village Voice, posters at the clubhouse, and on Facebook 3 weeks before the event. Tickets go on sale 3 weeks before the event. Check the posters and/or Facebook to determine who is selling tickets.
- 3. Events that are categorized as only entertainment will cost \$10 per ticket (refundable at the door). Since there is no food at these events tickets can be purchased up until the day of the event if tickets are still available. You must cancel within 48 hours of the event to receive a refund. Tickets must be returned to whoever is selling tickets for that event so they can be distributed to those on the waiting list, if any. You cannot sell or give your ticket(s) to anyone else. If you do not return your ticket within 48 hours of the event your money will not be refunded.
- 4. Events that are categorized as including food will cost \$20 per ticket (refundable at the door). The sale of these tickets will be cut off 7 days before the event to ensure we get a correct headcount to the caterer. You must cancel within 48 hours of the event to receive a refund. Tickets must be returned to whoever is selling tickets for that event so they can be distributed to those on the waiting list, if any. You cannot sell or give your ticket(s) to anyone else. If you do not return your ticket within 48 hours of the event your money will not be refunded.
- 5. Guest or family tickets are not refundable. They will also be placed on the waiting list and can only purchase tickets once all residents can purchase tickets. Usually, 10 days before the event if all tickets are not sold the waiting list people will get the opportunity to purchase tickets in the order they are on the waiting list.



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
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
